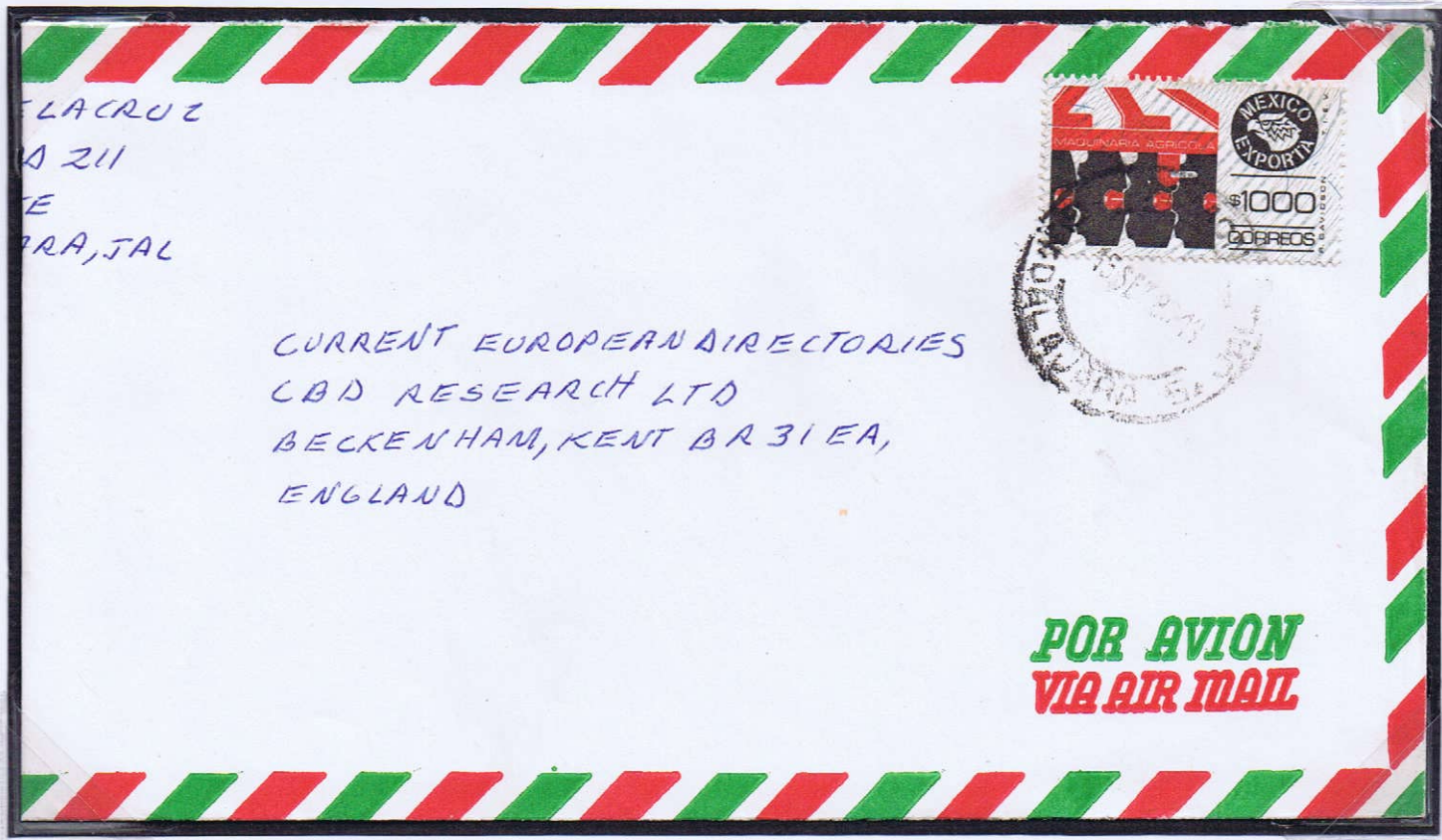
The gum is bright and the only variations are two significant colour varieties.

Sep 1993 - \$2000 then N\$2.00 (after devaluation) as standard letter rate to N America, with (N\$5.00) paying registration rate, which should have been \$4.80 - (Tariff 48, 27 Jan 1993 – 30 April 1995) .



Nov 1995 use of \$3000 as N\$3.00 (after devaluation). N\$15.00 overpays total of N\$14.70 made up of N\$3.70 postage (over 20g), N\$6.00 registration to specified person and N\$3.90 AR (Tariff 48). Mexican registration card attached. As the series 9 stamps were all high values, they were sold for many years after they were printed (DLG).



Late use within Mexico of \$4000 as \$4.00 new pesos, with N\$1.00 commemorative short paying rate of \$2.60 postage and \$2.60 registration (Tariff 49 Apr 1995 – 31 Dec 1999).

This series was produced over a long period, from 1987 to 1991 and used well beyond that time. During this time the basic airmail postage rate increased from 750 pesos to 2000 pesos. High values of the early years became the normal rate in latter years.

In this series stamps with the same value and design were issued with and without burelage. The later issue of a particular value was made without burelage as the stamp was not considered a high value, due to inflation, and therefore did not warrant security protection.

There is no official record of a \$5000 cotton stamp in series 10 but it is recognized by MEPSI, JOV, and Celis Cano. The paper on this stamp is series 10 not 13.

In series 10 and later in series 13 the main varieties were a wide range of colours in some denominations and a difference in the intensities of the fluorescence on the reverse of the stamp. The latter is beyond the scope of the exhibit. DLG, MEPSI and Shelton all give colour classifications with slight differences. DLG is used for reference in a selection of colour varieties.

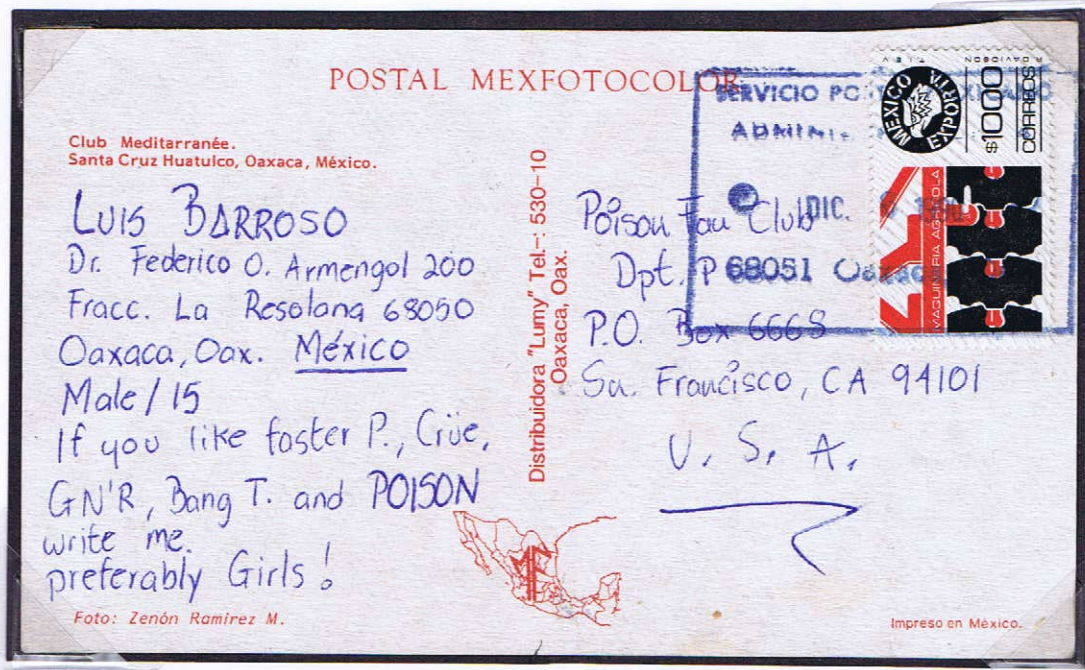

\$1000 single, bright red and deep black with burelage for postcard rate to N America (Tariff 45)



\$1000 deep red with matte black, no burelage used for letter rate to N America Dec 1991 (Tariff 47)



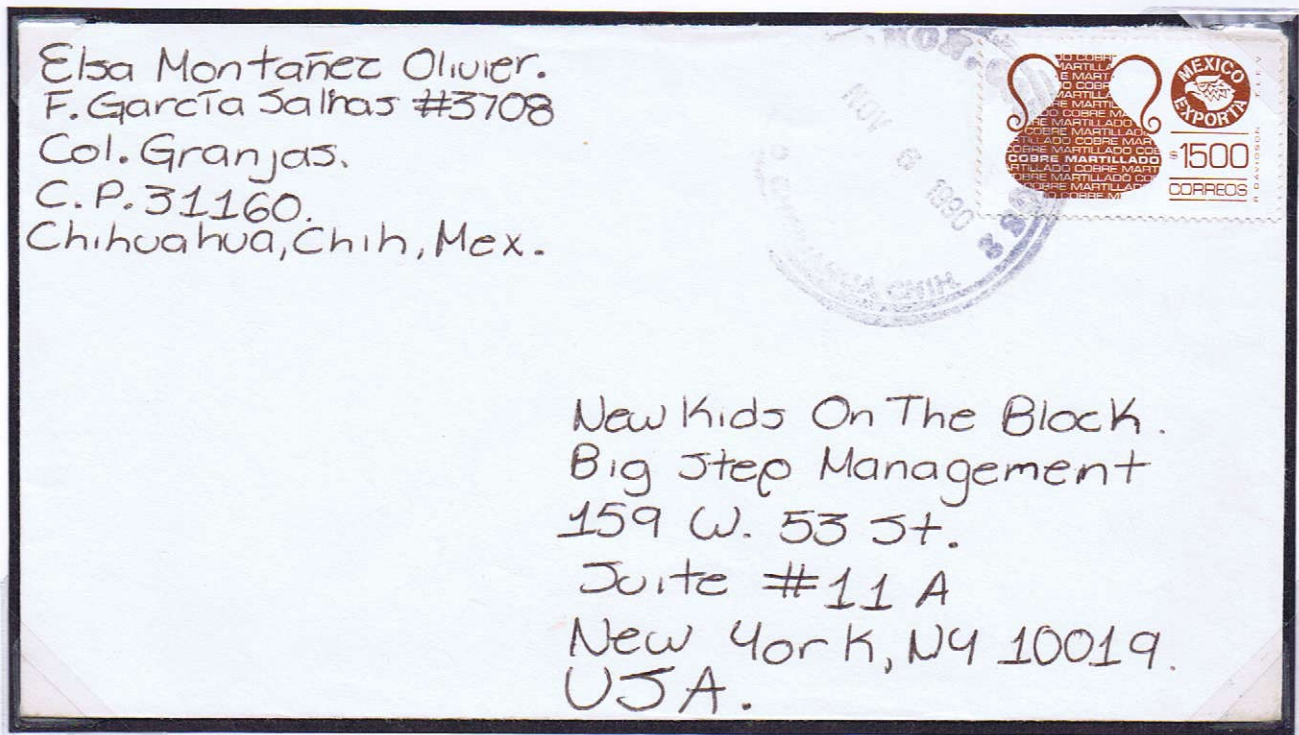
\$1100 with burelage letter rate to North America (Tariff 44)



\$1300 with burelage letter rate for usage within Mexico (Tariff 47 1 Dec 1991 – 27 Jan 93)  
 Covers used within Mexico are generally much scarcer than used to North America



\$1400 series 10 paying \$2500 letter rate to South America (Tariff 46, 47 or 48) date not discernable with a \$1100 series 13 without burelage.



\$1500 standard letter rate to North America (Tariff 45)



Registered internally within Mexico as N\$6.30. (Tariff 50 1 Jan 1999 – 1 Jan 2002)  
 This is another instance of the registration rate being paid and not the postage.



Standard letter rate to Europe sent between Dec 91 and April 95 (Tariff 47 or 48)

Series 11, 12 and 14 are recognized by TIEV although only three stamps were produced in total for the three series. Series 11 and 12 are similar to series 10, whereas series 14 is closer to 13. The numbers produced ranged from 9 to 15 million so are relatively common.
