

Information for Bidders

Bidding

The following means are available for placing bids:

- 1) Attending the Live Auction in Person: All bidders must register for a paddle, and new bidders must provide references at least three business days in advance of the sale.
- **2) Live Internet Bidding:** Instructions for participating as a Live Internet Bidder are provided on the page opposite.
- **3) Phone Bidding:** Bidders can be connected to the sale by phone and bid through a member of staff. Requests for phone bidding are subject to approval (please contact our office at least 24 hours before the sale). A signed Bid Form is required.
- **4) Absentee Bids.** All bids received in advance of the sale, either by mail, fax, phone, e-mail or internet, are Absentee Bids, which instruct the auctioneer to bid up to a specific amount on one or more lots in the sale. Absentee Bids sent by phone, fax or e-mail should arrive at least one hour prior to the start of the sale session. Bids entered through Live Internet Bidding will be visible to the auctioneer during the sale. Written bids should be entered legibly on the Bid Form in the sale catalogue. E-mail and internet bids should be carefully typed and double-checked. All new bidders must provide references. We recommend calling or e-mailing to confirm that Absentee Bids sent by mail, fax or e-mail have been received and entered.

Pre-Sale Viewing

Subject to availability, certain lots (except group lots) can be sent to known clients for examination. Requests must be made no later than 7 days prior to the sale. Lots must be returned on the day received. Postage/insurance costs will be invoiced.

In addition to regular viewing, clients may view lots by appointment. Our staff will be pleased to answer questions or provide additional information about lots.

Expert Certification

Individual items offered without a current certificate (PF dated within the past five years of sale; PSE dated January 2004 or later) may be purchased subject to independent certification of genuineness and our description. Please refer to the Conditions of Sale and Grading Terms for policies governing certification.

Shipping and Delivery

Procedures and charges for shipping lots are printed on the back of the Bid Form. Bidders are responsible for all prescribed shipping charges and any applicable sales tax or customs duties.



Conditions of Sale (please read carefully before bidding)

The property described in this catalogue will be offered at public auction by Robert A. Siegel Auction Galleries, Inc. ("Galleries") on behalf of various consignors and itself or affiliated companies. By bidding on any lot, whether directly or by or through an agent, in person, or by telephone, facsimile or any other means, the bidder acknowledges and agrees to all of the following Conditions of Sale.

- 1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 15% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax, use tax or customs duties due on the sale.
- 2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute between bidders, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.
- 3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for the failure to execute such bids or for any errors in the execution of such bids.
- 4. Lots with numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to a confidential minimum bid ("reserve"), below which the lot will not be sold. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without a reserve. If there is no reserve, the auctioneer has sole discretion to establish a minimum opening bid and may refuse an offer of less than half of the published estimate. Any lot that does not reach its reserve or opening bid requested by the auctioneer will be announced as "passed" and excluded from the prices realized lists after the sale. The Galleries may have a direct or indirect ownership interest in any or all lots in the sale resulting from an advance of monies or goods-in-trade or a guarantee of minimum net proceeds made by the Galleries to the seller.
- 5. Subject to the exclusions listed in 5(A), the Galleries will accept the return of lots which have been misidentified or which have obvious faults that were present when the lot was in the Galleries' custody, but not so noted in the lot description. All disputed lots must be received by the Galleries intact with the original packing material within 5 days of delivery to the buyer but no later than 30 days from the sale date. (5A) EXCLUSIONS: The following lots may not be returned for any reason: lots containing 10 or more items; lots from buyers who registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; any lot described with "faults," "defects" or a specific fault may not be returned because of any secondary fault. Photographed lots may not be returned because of centering, margins, short/nibbed perforations or other factors shown in the illustrations. Lots may not be returned for any of the following reasons: the color of the item does not match the color reproduction in the sale catalogue or website listing; the description contains inaccurate information about the quantity known or reported; or a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description.
- 6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make payment in full before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within 3 days from the date of sale. The Galleries retains the right to demand a cash deposit from anyone prior to bidder registration and/or to demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down to the highest bidder, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in cash

for any lot at the time it is knocked down to him, the auctioneer reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the highest bidder. **Credit cards are not accepted as payment.**

- 7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within 7 days from the date of sale, the lots will be resold by whatever means deemed appropriate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer. Any account more than 30 days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 1½% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter. A fee of \$250.00 per check will be charged for each check returned for insufficient funds.
- 8. All lots are sold as genuine. Any lot accompanied by a certificate issued by The Philatelic Foundation within 5 years of the sale date or by Professional Stamp Experts since January 2004 is sold "as is" and in accordance with the description on the certificate. Such lots may not be returned for any reason, including but not **limited to a contrary certificate of opinion.** Buyers who wish to obtain a certificate for any item that does not have a P.F. or P.S.E. certificate (dated as above) may do so, provided that the following conditions are met: (1) the purchase price must be paid in full, (2) the item must be submitted to an acceptable expertizing committee with a properly executed application form within 21 days of the sale, (3) a copy of the application form must be given to the Galleries, (4) in the event that an adverse opinion is received, the Galleries retain the right to resubmit the item on the buyer's behalf for reconsideration, without time limit or other restrictions, (5) unless written notification to the contrary is received, items submitted for certification will be considered cleared 90 days from the date of sale, and (6) in the event any item is determined to be "not as described", the buyer will be refunded the purchase price and the certification fee up to \$600.00 unless otherwise agreed.
- 9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of the Galleries on behalf of the seller.
- 10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients will be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.
- 11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots and agrees to pay for prescribed shipping costs. Buyers outside the U.S. are responsible for all customs duties.
- 12. The bidder consents that any action or proceeding against it may be commenced and maintained in any court within the State of New York or in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, that the courts of the State of New York and United States District Court for the Southern District of New York shall have jurisdiction with respect to the subject matter hereof and the person of the bidder. The bidder agrees not to assert any defense to any action or proceeding initiated by Galleries based upon improper venue or inconvenient forum. The bidder agrees that any action brought by the bidder shall be commenced and maintained only in a Federal Court in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York or the State Court in the county in which Galleries has its principal place of business in New York. These Terms and Conditions shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the substantive laws of the State of New York.

Grades, Abbreviations and Values Used in Descriptions

Grades and Centering

Our descriptions contain detailed information and observations about each item's condition. We have also assigned grades to stamps and covers, which reflect our subjective assessment. For stamps, the margin width, centering and gum are described and graded according to generally-accepted standards (an approximate correlation to numeric grades is provided at right). Although we believe our grades are accurate, they are not always exactly aligned with third-party grading terms or standards for all issues. A lot may not be returned because a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description. Information from the P.S.E. Stamp Market Quarterly and P.S.E. Population Report^{5M} is the most current available, but lots may not be returned due to errors or changes in statistics or data.

Extremely Fine Gem (90-100): The term "Gem" describes condition that is the finest possible for the issue. This term is equivalent to "Superb" used by grading services.

Extremely Fine (80-90): Exceptionally large/wide margins or near perfect centering.

Very Fine (70-85): Normal-size margins for the issue and well-centered with the design a bit closer to one side. "Very Fine and choice" applies to stamps that have desirable traits such as rich color, sharp impression, freshness or clarity of cancel.

Fine (60-70): Smaller than usual margins or noticeably off center. Pre-1890 issues may have the design touched in places.

Very Good (below 60): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations cut into the design.

For example, stamps issued in tropical climates are expected to have some gum disturbance due to humidity, and such condition is not considered a negative factor in pricing.			

Covers

Minor nicks, short edge tears, flap tears and slight reduction at one side are normal conditions for 19th century envelopes. Folded letters should be expected to have at least one file fold. Light cleaning of covers and small mends along the edges are accepted forms of conservation. Unusual covers may have a common stamp with a slight crease or tiny tear. These flaws exist in virtually all 19th century covers and are not always described. They are not grounds for return.

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, the currently available *Scott Catalogue* values are quoted in dollars with a decimal point. Other catalogues are often used for foreign countries or specialized areas and are referred to by their common name: *Stanley Gibbons* (SG), *Dietz, American Air Mail Catalogue* (AAMC), *Michel, Zumstein, Facit*, etc. Estimates are indicated with an "E." and reflect our conservative valuation in dollars. Reserves will never exceed the low end of the estimate range; they will sometimes exceed Scott Catalogue value for stamps in Extremely Fine condition.

Because of certain pricing inconsistencies in the *Scott Catalogue*—for example, blocks that have no gum, the absence of premiums for Mint N.H. items, etc.—we cannot guarantee the accuracy of values quoted for multiples, specialized items and collection lots. We generally try to be conservative, but buyers may not return a lot because of a discrepancy in catalogue value due to Scott pricing inconsistencies.



The Jerome S. Wagshal Collection of Classic United States Stamps

PREFACE

In HIS NUMEROUS ARTICLES, PRESENTATIONS AND REGULAR SUNDAY morning phone conversations with friends, Jerry Wagshal would often implore collectors to *look at their stamps*. It sounds obvious, but Jerry was shocked by—and often disdainful of—collector indifference to the true character of the stamps they owned. He felt that many collectors were dazzled by big margins and perfect centering, but failed to look at a stamp carefully enough to detect unusual features that told a significant part of the stamp's story. To Jerry, collectors too often seemed like a man obsessed with a woman's cleavage and derrière, failing to appreciate her mind and personality. He had little tolerance of such behavior, at least in the philatelic aspect of that analogy.

Apart from the educational benefits of philatelic scholarship, Jerry believed that possessing knowledge made it possible to discover *sleepers*, the unrecognized and undervalued stamps offered by dealers and auction firms. Jerry spent countless hours plowing through retail stocks and auction viewings, hoping to detect a sleeper that no one else saw. He was frequently successful. Some of the items Jerry acquired for his collection are off center or have faults, but one must remember that he bought almost all of these as the more common and cheaper variety: a 1¢ 1857 Type Ia (Scott 19) sold by a dealer as a Type IIIa (Scott 22); a 12¢ 1875 Reprint (Scott 44) sold as a regular issue (Scott 36); a 3¢ Z Grill (Scott 85C) described in an auction as an E Grill (Scott 88), and so on.

Finding a sleeper was the ultimate validation of Jerry's conviction that in all aspects of life, "knowledge is power." Jerry politely admired collectors who built a collection based upon the knowledge of others, but he only *respected* collectors who could sift through a pile of unidentified items and find the good ones. He would also kick himself for missing one. I remember finding a cover with a strip of three $3 \notin Z$ Grills in a well-attended auction that Jerry also viewed. He found and bought one rare misidentified grilled stamp in the auction, but this unique $3 \notin Z$ Grill cover escaped him. While congratulating me on my discovery, I think he was quietly thinking, "I won't let *that* happen again."

Jerry was a prolific writer and won numerous awards for his research articles on United States philatelic subjects. He was especially proud of his achievements in uncovering the truth about a misunderstood item—the $3 \not\in$ Scarlet and Chicago Perforations, to name two of his groundbreaking research subjects—and he maintained voluminous records of photographs and notes to aid in his quest for new research discoveries. Much of that material has been turned over to me by Jerry's wife and companion (and philatelic executor), Mary Wagshal. Making that reference material available to philatelists through the internet and the Siegel library is one way we plan to carry on Jerry's legacy.

The series of four auctions to be held from September 2010 through the early part of 2011 will unveil the full extent of Jerry Wagshal's collecting achievement. Jerry chided himself for having a Type A personality, which dictated his drive to acquire more, even when he clearly had enough to keep himself busy in study for more years than anyone could expect to live. Looking at the collection as a whole, I would characterize it as having four elements of acquisition, as follows:

First, there are the items Jerry acquired over five decades of collecting that were correctly described; for example, the strip of the 12¢ 1851 Issue on cover (lot 310) and the St. Louis "Bears" from the John Pope sale (lots 5-19).

Second, there are the sleepers. These are items that Jerry acquired because they were misidentified due to the ignorance or carelessness of professional dealers or auction describers; for example, the 1¢ 1851 Position 99R2 that Mary Wagshal spotted at the 1990 Garfield-Perry stamp show in Cleveland. It was under the glass at a dealer's booth, priced at \$75 as a common Type II, Scott 7, but Mary—who is not a

philatelist—saw the breaks at top and bottom and alerted Jerry, who immediately identified it as the coveted Position 99R2 (see Part 2, lot 936).

The third category of acquisitions applies to items that were basically identified correctly, but certain elements of their rarity were not fully understood or appreciated. In this category I place the 5¢ 1847 stamps that show a distinct recut left frameline where the weakly transferred frameline had worn away completely, causing a prominent break in certain positions. Jerry acquired as many of these as he could find, and it was his intention to publish an article that documented the recut left frameline. Now, with this sale (lots 137-155), any collector can become acquainted with this significant 1847 plate variety.

The fourth category of Jerry's acquisitions is what I call major "opportunity" purchases, such as the DeVere Card collection of $3 \not \in 1851$ -57's and the Mortimer L. Neinken collection of $1 \not \in 1851$ -57's, each of which was bought intact from their respective estates. In the Wagshal sale series, Parts 2 and 4 are devoted to the $1 \not \in 1851$ -57's, and Part 3 is exclusively $3 \not \in 1851$ -57's. As everyone will see, the depth of these specialized offerings is staggering, and the provenance is extraordinary. A good portion of the $1 \not \in 1851$ -57 material comes from the Neinken collection, and Neinken acquired some of it as far back as the 1940's, including private purchases from Stanley B. Ashbrook. DeVere Card acquired much of his $3 \not \in 1851$ plating material directly from Dr. Carroll Chase. This material has never been available during most collectors' lifetimes. The term fresh to the market seems like an understatement in describing these offerings.

The four Wagshal sales will be arranged as follows:

• Part 1: 1845-69 Issues—September 29, 2010 (this catalogue)

- Part 2: One-Cent 1851-56 Imperforate—September 30-October 1, 2010
- Part 3: Three-Cent 1851-57 Issues—late October 2010 (date to be announced)
- Part 4: One-Cent 1857-61 Perforated—2011 (date to be announced)

Each hardbund catalogue will put the items into context with notes and illustrations based on research by Jerry Wagshal and by scholars who preceded and followed him. In this context, the work of his friend and mentor, the late Mortimer L. Neinken, must be mentioned. Further, the recent work by Richard Celler and his colleagues who study the Toppan Carpenter plates has greatly expanded our knowledge of the 1851-57 Issues and should be acknowledged as an important source of information for this catalogue.

Finally, perhaps none of Jerry's wishes would have materialized were it not for his surviving spouse, Mary, who has diligently followed their plans for both philately and philanthropy. The educational elements of this sale process were a non-negotiable condition of consignment to the Siegel firm and to me personally. The proceeds of sale of the philatelic collection will go to Jewish charities that Jerry and Mary chose to endow before he died. Therefore, bidders and buyers can feel good knowing that the dispersal of Jerry's stamps will unleash material and knowledge, but equally if not more important, the dollars will help people in need, just as Jerry wanted.

On a personal level, this sale is the culmination of a long and lasting relationship with a man who regarded me as someone who looked at his stamps. I always felt honored to be a part of Jerry's inner circle. I recognize that he could be a demanding taskmaster and client. Jerry did not suffer fools, and if he felt someone was a poser—pretending to know when they did not—he could crush them. However, for those who shared his passion for knowledge, he was exceedingly generous. It was Jerry who told me during my brief "consulting" period between Christie's and Siegel that the life I was living might be fun, but it was nomadic. He warned me that a strong desert wind could blow away my tent, and he encouraged me to meet with Bob Siegel and carry on the business. He lived to see that happen, and I know he is watching this sale now with great interest. I fully expect to hear from him with a list of suggestions, corrections and criticism.

THE JEROME S. WAGSHAL COLLECTION OF CLASSIC UNITED STATES STAMPS

NEW YORK POSTMASTER'S PROVISIONAL

VERY FINE. THIS IS THE EARLIEST DOCUMENTED USE OF THE NEW YORK POSTMASTER'S PROVISIONAL ISSUE, AND IT IS BY FAR THE FINER OF THE TWO KNOWN DOMESTIC COVERS POSTMARKED ON JULY 15, 1845. AN IMPORTANT UNITED STATES POSTAL HISTORY ARTIFACT, BEING THE EARLIEST RECORDED USE OF THE FIRST POSTMASTERS' PROVISIONAL ISSUE.

According to the Piller book, it is believed that the first delivery of the New York provisionals was on Saturday, July 12, 1845. The post office was open for only a short time on Sunday, and so it is believed that the stamps were not placed on sale until Monday, July 14. Ten covers are recorded used on Tuesday, July 15, including three to France, two to Germany, three to England and two addressed to other U.S. post offices. The other domestic cover is flawed by a sharp vertical filing crease through the stamp. All ten July 15 covers have stamps without the control initials. The earliest recorded cover with the control initials is postmarked on July 17.



ST. LOUIS "BEARS" POSTMASTER'S PROVISIONAL

After the July 1845 postal reforms paved the way for adhesive stamp use by simplifying the rate structure, the postmaster in St. Louis, John M. Wimer, had his own provisional stamps printed. Wimer served the midwestern gateway city of St. Louis as postmaster, alderman and mayor. The basic design of the St. Louis provisional stamps—two bears holding the state coat of arms—was chosen to symbolize Missourians' rugged durability. The "Bears" engraving is one of the most elaborate of all United States Postmasters' Provisionals.

The Missouri Republican, November 5, 1845, contained the following notice:

LETTER STAMPS. Mr. Wimer, the postmaster, has prepared a set of letter stamps, or rather marks, to be put upon letters, indicating that the postage has been paid. In this he has copied after the plan adopted by the postmaster of New York and other cities. These stamps are engraved to represent the Missouri Coat of Arms, and are five and ten cents. They are so prepared that they may be stuck upon a letter like a wafer and will prove a great convenience to merchants and all those having many letters to send post paid, as it saves all trouble of paying at the post-office. They will be sold as they are sold in the East, viz.: Sixteen five-cent stamps and eight ten-cent stamps for a dollar. We would recommend merchants and others to give them a trial.

In the same paper one week later (November 12, 1845) a follow-up announcement appeared:

POST-OFFICE STAMPS. Mr. Wimer, the postmaster, requests us to say that he will furnish nine ten-cent stamps and eighteen five-cent stamps for one dollar, the difference being required to pay for the printing of the stamps.

It seems likely that the second, more abbreviated announcement was published to amend the number of stamps sold for a dollar from "sixteen" to "eighteen" for the 5c and "eight" to "nine" for the 10c, which corresponds to 90 cents in stamps for one dollar in money. The earlier 80 cents for a dollar exchange rate might have been too high for the public to bear. The ambiguous wording of the announcements does not tell us if the stamps were available when the first announcement was made (November 5) or at the time of the second announcement (November 12). However, the earliest documented use of any St. Louis "Bears" stamp is the cover offered in this sale (lot 6), postmarked November 13 (1845) on a letter dated November 12.

The "Bears" were printed from an engraved copper plate comprising six subjects arranged in two vertical rows of three. The original plate was made by a local engraver, J. M. Kershaw, and it was altered twice. The states of the plate (1, 2 and 3) roughly correspond to the papers used (Greenish, Gray Lilac and Bluish Pelure), so philatelists say there were three printings (First, Second and Third). The three states of the plate are shown and described below.



State 1 (Original State)



EARLIEST DOCUMENTED USE OF ST. LOUIS "BEARS"

Nov. 13" (1845) circular datestamp and matching "Paid" handstamp, manuscript "10" rate, stamp has short pre-use wrinkle at left (not noted on accompanying certificate and mentioned here only as a formality)

EXTREMELY FINE. THIS NOVEMBER 13, 1845, POSTMARK DATE REPRESENTS THE EARLIEST DOCUMENTED USE OF ANY ST. LOUIS POSTMASTER'S PROVISIONAL STAMP, IN CLOSE PROXIMITY TO THE POSTMASTER'S ANNOUNCEMENTS OF THE NEW ISSUE. THE COVER OFFERED HERE IS THE ONLY RECORDED EXAMPLE OF THE NOVEMBER 13 DATE, AND THE POSSIBILITY OF ANOTHER ST. LOUIS "BEARS" DISCOVERY PUSHING THIS DATE ANY EARLIER IS EXTREMELY REMOTE.

The first announcement of the new stamps was made in the Wednesday, November 5, 1845, weekly edition of the *Missouri Republican* and stated (in part): "Mr. Wimer, the postmaster, has prepared a set of letter stamps... Sixteen five-cent stamps and eight ten-cent stamps for a dollar. We would recommend merchants and others to give them a trial." One week later, in the *Missouri Republican* of Wednesday, November 12, 1845, a second announcement appeared (in part): "Mr. Wimer, the postmaster, requests us to say that he will furnish nine ten-cent stamps and eighteen five-cent stamps for one dollar..." [the full announcements are quoted on page 13]. The ambiguous wording of the announcements does not tell us if the stamps were available when the first announcement was made (November 5) or at the time of the second announcement (November 12). However, the earliest documented use of any St. Louis "Bears" stamp is the cover offered here, postmarked November 13 (1845) on a letter dated November 12.

Five large groups of St. Louis "Bears" have been discovered during the past 165 years. In 1869 J. W. Scott acquired a correspondence bearing 50 of the 5c, 100 of the 10c and three 20c stamps, probably all of which have been removed from their original covers. In 1880 the Riggs correspondence produced 20 examples of the 5c and 10c. In 1889 the J. & J. Stuart correspondence provided 25 examples of the 5c and 10c, most on Pelure paper. The huge "Louisville" find in 1895, salvaged by a janitor who was burning papers, yielded 75 of the 5c, 46 of the 10c and 16 of the 20c, including se-tenant multiples that revealed the plate layout and proved the authenticity of the 20c stamps, which had been in question since 1869. All of the stamps in the Louisville find were found on covers addressed to Tyler & Rutherford, a banking firm in Louisville, but many of the stamps were later removed. Additional material from the Tyler & Rutherford correspondence surfaced around 1902 and was acquired by C. H. Mekeel. In 1912 the first portion of the Charnley & Whelen correspondence reached philatelists, which provided another six of the 5c, 61 of the 10c and 16 of the 20c. Additional Charnley & Whelen covers were sold over the next three decades. The cover offered here comes from the December 1948 H. R. Harmer sale of the Charnley & Whelen correspondence.

The presence of a 20c impression on a 10c stamp on Greenish paper is significant, even as offset, for the reasons we shall explain. The original plate comprised three 5c stamps (left vertical row) and three 10c stamps (right vertical row), and the printing from the plate in this state was made exclusively on Greenish paper. Shortly after, two of the 5c subjects (Positions 1 and 3) were altered by burnishing out the "5" numeral on each and engraving a "20" in its place. Impressions from the altered plate containing two 20c subjects was made almost exclusively on Gray Lilac paper, but the existence of five 20c stamps on Greenish paper is evidence that at least some impressions from the altered plate were made on this paper color. It is assumed that a small supply of Greenish paper was mixed in with the Gray Lilac sheets when the second printing was made.

10c Greenish paper stamps cannot be assigned to the original or altered state of the plate, because the 10c subjects remained the same. However, there are two conditions that permit identification. The most obvious condition is when the 10c is part of a 20c multiple or has some part of an adjoining 20c (on Greenish paper). However, no 10c/20c se-tenant pairs are known on Greenish paper (the two known examples are on Gray Lilac). The second condition is more subtle and is demonstrated by the pair offered here: the back of the pair has offset of the 20c value, which is visual and undeniable proof that the pair was printed from the altered plate. It could only occur if the original sheet had been turned 180 degrees before being placed on the sheet beneath, which left the offset impression of the opposing vertical row.

The original plate of six subjects used to print the St. Louis "Bears" provisional stamps comprised three 5c and three 10c stamps. The first printing from this plate was made exclusively on Greenish paper and issued in early November 1845. Shortly after, two of the 5c subjects (Positions 1 and 3) were altered by burnishing out the "5" numeral on each and engraving a "20" in its place. Impressions from the altered plate containing two 20c subjects was made almost exclusively on Gray Lilac paper. The cover offered here is the earliest *cover* bearing a St. Louis "Bears" stamp on Gray Lilac paper (and from the altered plate), clearly postmarked February 27 (1846). There are a few stamps off cover with slightly earlier February dates, which could be 1846 or 1847.

The St. Louis "Bears" stamps were printed from a single plate of six subjects (two horizontal by three vertical) that was modified twice to change the denominations of two positions. The original plate contained three 5c stamps at left and three 10c stamps at right. All stamps from the first state of the plate were printed on Greenish paper. The plate was then altered by burnishing out the "5" on Positions 1 and 3 and engraving a new "20" denomination. A small printing on Greenish paper was made from this altered plate. 5c stamps (Position 5) and 10c stamps (Positions 2/4/6) on Greenish Paper cannot usually be identified as original or altered plate impressions (the 20c on Greenish paper is a great rarity). The larger portion of stamps from the altered plate are on Gray Lilac paper. However, because only one of six subjects was a 5c value, the 5c on Gray Lilac is an extremely rare stamp — perhaps even rarer than the 20c on Gray Lilac. The plate was modified again by burnishing out each "20" and engraving the old "5" denomination (third state). At the time of this second alteration, a large ball was engraved inside the end curl of the numeral "5" on Position 5. As far as we know, all stamps from the third state of the plate were printed on a very thin pelure paper. These were the last stamps used before the 1847 Issue was placed on sale in St. Louis.

The second and final alteration to the St. Louis "Bears" plate restored the two "5" (cent) denominations to Positions 1 and 3, where the "20" (cent) numerals had been engraved during the first alteration of the plate. The "20" numerals had been engraved in an entirely different style, but the re-engraved "5" numerals closely match the numerals on the original plate. When this alteration was made, the engraver also strengthened the dot inside the ball at the bottom end of the "5" in Position 5, which gives us an easy way to differentiate between Position 5 stamps printed on Gray Lilac paper (without the large dot) and stamps from the same position printed on Bluish Pelure paper (with the dot). The 5c stamps from the re-engraved Positions 1 and 3 have noticeably different numerals and should really be called Types IV and V, rather than "Types I and II re-engraved." The stamp on the cover offered here has a part impression of the re-engraved 5c Position 1 (Type IV). To the best of our knowledge, this stamp is not only a singular example of a Postmaster's Provisional printed on both sides, but it is the earliest United States postage stamp printed on both sides and one of three stamps in American philately with two different denominations on the same stamp (the other two are revenue stamps).

The St. Louis "Bears" stamps on Pelure paper are the among the rarest stamps in the world. The census data reproduced in the Faiman collection sale catalogue (Matthew Bennett, Oct. 31, 2003) lists six covers (one of which is a front) for the 5c Pelure (Scott 11X7) and two covers and two fronts for the normal 10c (Scott 11X8), plus the unique 11X8a cover offered here. The earliest date for any Pelure stamp is November 25, 1846 (the cover offered here), and the next two sequential dates for any of the "Bears" are December 4, 1846 (10c Gray Lilac), followed by December 17 (5c Gray Lilac, Position 5 without the retouch). The next sequential date for a Pelure stamp is January 11, 1847 (bearing two 5c Pelure, addressed to Benton). The use of St. Louis "Bears" seems to have dropped significantly by mid-1847, and, starting in July the new 1847 Issue rendered the provisional stamps obsolete.

Information about the addressee, Wayman Crow (1808-85), is available on Wikipedia. He was a businessman and politician, and one of the founders of Washington University. He moved to St. Louis in 1835 and was elected in 1840 to the Missouri state senate. In 1846 he secured the charter for the St. Louis Mercantile Library Association, the oldest library west of the Mississippi River. In 1853 he secured the charter for Eliot Seminary, the precursor to Washington University. He continued as a member of the board of trustees until his death in 1885, when he was assassinated on the campus of Washington University.

The St. Louis "Bears" stamps on Pelure paper are the among the rarest stamps in the world. The census data reproduced in the Faiman collection sale catalogue (Matthew Bennett, Oct. 31, 2003) lists six covers (one of which is a front) for the 5c Pelure (Scott 11X7) and two covers and two fronts for the normal 10c (Scott 11X8), plus the unique 11X8a cover offered in lot 12. Two of the 5c covers have two stamps for the 10c rate (including this one), and one has four 5c Pelure stamps and a 10c Greenish, but the stamps are extensively repaired.

In an article in the August 1995 Chronicle, Jerome S. Wagshal summarized previous writings on this double transfer. It was first discovered by Dan Hammatt around 1920. Mr. Wagshal recorded a total of $13\frac{1}{2}$ copies (one is a half-stamp in a strip). He also echoes Ashbrook's theory that this and the double transfer Type D were created when the plate was reworked sometime in late 1850 and were only part of the fifth delivery from RWH&E in December 1850. This would account for their scarcity compared to the Type A and B double transfers, and it seems to be confirmed by the two examples known on cover, which were described by Ashbrook as 1851 usages. The distinctive Orange Brown shade also points to the Fifth Delivery.



In an article in the 1942 Stamp Specialist, Stanley Ashbrook describes the four double transfers that were known at the time. The Type D was discovered by Ashbrook in 1921 in the collection of noted philatelist Judge Robert S. Emerson. After publishing his discovery, serious philatelists of the day looked for confirming copies but were unable to find any. Finally, more than 20 years later, Lambert Gerber found one, as the top left stamp in a block of four. It is believed that this and the double transfer Type C were created when the plate was reworked sometime in late 1850 and were only part of the Fifth Delivery from RWH&E in December 1850. This would account for their scarcity compared to the Type A and B double transfers.

The so-called "Mower Shift" is named after its discoverer, the San Francisco dealer R. H. Mower. In an article discussing this rare position in the November 1976 *Chronicle*, Duane Garrett quotes a letter from Stanley B. Ashbrook, which states "this 'E' variety is quite scarce, much more than either the 'A' or 'B', probably due to the fact that the extra lines were not cut very deep on the plate and soon wore away. I believe that we can only find the 'E' among the very earliest prints from the plate."



The 5c 1847 plate was entered from a single-relief transfer roll. In certain positions, the left frameline across from Franklin's eyes was weakly transferred. The weak lines continued to wear and developed breaks (shown below at left). On a number of positions, this line was recut. Jerry Wagshal and other 1847 Issue plating students have known about this recut left frameline variety for years, but the Scott Catalogue and market in general have overlooked it. We hope that this offering of correctly-identified broken and recut left frameline examples will awaken all philatelists to their existence and stimulate interest and research in this area. No one has yet succeeded in assigning the recut positions to their plate positions.

It was not possible for any 1847 Issue stamps to be used on that voyage, because Boston did not receive their supply of 1847 stamps until the following day. The next Cunarder to sail was the *Caledonia*, which left Boston on July 16. The cover offered here was posted in Philadelphia on July 14, and made it to Boston in time for the July 16 sailing. This is the only recorded 10c 1847 cover carried on this voyage. Two 5c 1847 covers are also recorded for this sailing, one of which is addressed to Ireland and has a July 15 New York datestamp (offered as lot 177 in this sale). The other 5c 1847 cover from this *Caledonia* sailing was mailed from New York to Liverpool, but it lacks a post office datestamp and is dated from the contents.

Aside from transatlantic usages, the earliest reported use to Canada is July 17. It is theoretically possible that an earlier cover to Canada or to another foreign destination which did not involve a transatlantic sailing could be found. However, as the record stands now, the cover offered here is the earliest 1847 Issue cover to a foreign destination.

Until the discovery of this item by Earl Oakley, it was not known whether the plate used to print the imperforate 12c stamp had a plate number. According to a summary of previous knowledge in article by James A. Allen in the 1851 Sesquicentennial book, three plates were made. Plate 3, which was used to print Scott 36B, has a plate number printed in the selvage. The stamp offered here proves that Plate One did not. No stamps have been definitively recorded from Plate 2, and it may never have been used.

As far as early classic U.S. plates are concerned, several did not have the plate numbers indicated, but this appears to have changed quickly. For example, on the 1c stamps, Plate 1 did not have the plate number, but it was added when the plate was reworked in 1852 (Plate 2 was numbered from the start). For the 3c 1851, Plates 1E, 2E, 5E and 0 all have imprints but no plate numbers, and these were among the first plates used.





However, only the misplaced transfers in Positions 1L and 2L produced Type III's in the top row. A Type II-III combination in a horizontal pair is only possible with Positions 2-3L.

The 90c stamp was issued in 1860, along with the 24c and 30c values, all of which were needed to prepay high international letter rates established by various postal treaties. However, the 90c saw much more limited use, partly due to the rates in effect, but more because of the American Civil War. When supplies of current postage stamps were declared invalid in the South and ultimately demonetized by the Federal government, the 90c had been in use for only one year. For this reason, genuinely cancelled copies and covers bearing the 90c are extremely rare. Approximately 180 used examples have been certified as genuine by the Philatelic Foundation, of which approximately one-quarter are sound. Of these sound examples, many are off-center.

In 1861 the contract for printing postage stamps was awarded to The National Bank Note Company after Toppan Carpenter's contract expired on June 10, 1861. The designs were changed and the earlier stamps were demonetized, primarily as a means of depriving the seceding states of a form of currency.

National Bank Note Company apparently submitted gummed and perforated samples of their designs. Of the original submitted designs, the 24c and 30c were not altered in any way before approval and use. The original samples for these two denominations were printed in a different shade, and are currently listed in the Trial Color Proof section of Scott Catalogue. A quantity of the 10c First Design was printed and issued from this original plate, although they were likely printed after the normal stamp (Scott 68) was issued. The likely reason is that the original plate was brought into use to keep up with demand for the 10c stamps. Therefore, only the 10c, 24c and 30c plates as originally made were used to print issued stamps. The other denominations — 1c, 3c, 5c, 12c and 90c — Scott Nos. 55, 56, 57, 59 and 62 — were never issued in their original designs. These are called "Premiere Gravures" by students of the issue.

It is likely that a small supply of the original designs and colors reached philatelic hands at an early stage, which accounts for their existence in the hands of collectors. Several other denominations are known cancelled — a 12c is known with manuscript "New" written across the design — but the placement and style of cancel means that they cannot conclusively be shown to have gone through the mails, and may be experimental or control cancels. The exception is the stamp offered here, which has an identifiable town circular datestamp cancel, and was probably mailed by a philatelist or stamp dealer.

As has been documented by Jerome S. Wagshal in a series of *Chronicle* articles (Nos. 56, 60, 61 and 62), Carl F. Rothfuchs, a Washington D.C. stamp dealer, obtained a supply of the 3c Scarlet in 1893 — probably from the Post Office Department in exchange for his assistance with the Columbian Exposition — and sold them with pen marks and original gum. A small number were also used by J. W. Scott, who posted letters with some of his supply to validate his claim that these stamps were legitimate postage. Today, there are perhaps five copies cancelled in this manner. The last we offered with this cancel was in 2001



This 1c C Grill Points Down essay originated in the Charles F. Steel archive and was part of the Earl of Crawford and George Worthington collections. The grill is made up of tiny "X" pyramidal points impressed into the face, points down. This male grill differs from the issued C Grill, which was made by a female grill surface of embossed depressions. When applied to the sheet, facing toward the depressions, the female C Grill created raised bosses on the face of each stamp.

The various experimental grilled stamps were acquired by the Earl of Crawford from the archive of papers and stamps retained by Charles F. Steel, who patented the grilling device. This 1c appeared in the Worthington sale. The 3c, 5c, 10c, 12c and 30c values with C Grill Points Up and Down were sold in the Col. E. H. R. Green sale (Part XXV, Costales sale, Feb. 18-21, 1946, lots 204-213) and are currently owned by a midwest collector. 

The 3c Z Grill was in production for only a short period of time before the device was replaced with the F Grill. Only a small number of 3c sheets were fed thru the Z Grill, which accounts for the rarity of surviving examples, especially in sound, original-gum condition. Our review of past auctions, including Power Search, found precious few sound copies with Very Fine centering. The editors of *Stamp Market Quarterly* have had no basis to value a stamp graded better than 85 — the highest grade awarded to date is to the stamp offered here, and only two others share this grade.

Our census of used Scott 110 contains only seventeen examples, plus one with non-contemporary cancel. Of these, ten have faults. Most of the faulty examples have serious defects, such as repaired tears or thin spots. Very few copies, either sound or defective, have decent centering.

Jonathan W. Rose, in his book *United States Postage Stamps of 1869*, estimates that no more than five to ten copies of this error exist (our own estimate is 20-30; two are known used). Only one sheet of 100 was issued, and all were cut into singles by a clerk in the Third Assistant Postmaster General's office. It is not known how many were sold. We have only sold two other examples with original gum since 2003. Many seem to lack gum.

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
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
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
