Historically, this is one of the most controversial stamps ever prepared for issue, and its background and circumstance have given rise to a multitude of stories supported by various eyewitness accounts and official documents. Suffice it to say, that for whatever reason, the head of Charles Connell, the then Postmaster General of New Brunswick, was printed on the five cents value for the 1860 issue. This was completely at variance with the policy of depicting members of the Royal Family or famous historical figures on Colonial stamps. Following the printing of 500,000 examples of the Connell stamp, the Executive Council did not approve the design and instead instructed that a new five cents stamp bearing the portrait of Queen Victoria be produced in its place. Connell resigned his position, the stamp bearing his likeness was never issued, and practically the entire print run was destroyed. Robson Lowe estimated that, aside from the proofs, approximately 50 examples of the perforated stamps intended for issue have survived. Of these, Nicholas Argenti wrote that very few perfect examples with original gum exist, and even sound examples without gum are very rare. Postmaster General Edwin C. Madden. When postal authorities learned of the practice, they destroyed 194 copies and put one pane of 100 into the official archives. At a later date, 97 of these were traded for rarities missing from the archives.

We are in the process of studying this fascinating Invert "Special Printing" and have recorded imprint and plate number examples of the 4c Pan-American Invert from the bottoms of four different sheets of 100, each comprising left and right panes of 50 (six of the eight panes are represented by at least one bottom-margin position). The sequence of vignette plate letters in the bottom selvage, which were normally printed in the top selvage, can be used to identify Left or Right pane positions. These letters were applied each time the vignette plate was used, and the 4c Invert has the longest sequence of letters we can find on any 4c Pan-American, presumably because the plate was used for the last time to make the Invert "Special Printing" after the regular stamps were printed. There are at least 48 separate entries of the two or three-letter initials on the 4c Invert vignette plate.

For the purpose of identification, we will refer to these four sheets as S1, S2, S3 and S4 (Left/Right for each). From S1 Left we record three singles with plate letters and the unique plate block of four with the imprint and plate number. None of the S1 Left imprint stamps have a "Specimen" overprint. From S1 Right we record the imprint and plate number strip of four recently sold in the Cunliffe auction by Spink-Shreves. It, too, does not have a "Specimen" overprint. From S2 we record only one imprint and plate number single, from the Right pane and without overprint, ex Odeneal (Siegel Sale 941, lot 1207). From S3 we record an imprint and plate number single from the Left pane (Siegel Sale 745, lot 717) and another from the Right pane (the stamp offered here). Finally, from S4 we record an imprint and plate number single, from the Left pane and with "Specimen" overprint, ex Green and Cunliffe.

The Gregory census lists 18 covers with the 5c on 13c surcharge. This is the earliest recorded cover and the only multiple-rate franking. There are no pairs or larger multiples of the 5c provisional surcharge, and the stamps on this cover are further evidence that the postal clerks cut the stamps apart before they were sold. On this cover the Hawaiian stamps pay the quintuple 5c per half-ounce rate for a letter weighing between 2 and 21/2 ounces. The same multiple of the United States 10c per half-ounce rate was paid by the 1851-55 Issue stamps, and the additional 2c paid the ship captain so fee.

This cover was carried by the American bark Fanny Major, which cleared Honolulu on January 21, 1857, and arrived in San Francisco on February 6. At San Francisco the U.S. stamps were cancelled by the February 20 datestamp. From there it was carried to Panama on the Pacific Mail Steamship Company so John L. Stephens, which departed on February 20 and arrived at Panama City on March 5. It crossed the isthmus and was carried from Aspinwall to New York by the U.S. Mail Steamship Company so George Law, which departed on March 6 and arrived on March 16 after a stop at Havana. The George Law was renamed Central America later in 1857, the year that she sank in a hurricane, claiming hundreds of lives and tons of gold.

Thomas Knowles & Company, the addressee, was a New Bedford-based firm with extensive interests in the whaling industry. This large envelope probably held documents related to one of the firm swhaling voyages in the North Pacific.

In the 1957 Caspary sale held by H. R. Harmer, this cover was featured in a two-page spread, a level of treatment reserved for only the most important items. The \$8,500 realization was one-third the price achieved by the Dawson cover (with a 2c Missionary) in the same auction. It next appeared at auction in our 1967 sale of the Lilly collection (U.S. Possessions, Sale 317), where it realized \$15,500. In May 1979 the Siegel firm advertised the direct purchase of two United States covers for more than one-third of a million dollars, establishing a new world record. The two covers were illustrated in an advertisement in *Chronicle* 102: one was the 5c 1847 and Canada 3p Beaver strip, and the other was this Hawaiian mixed-franking cover. They were purchased from Philip G. Rust and sold to Ryohei



Ishikawa, becoming two pillars of his Grand Prix U.S. 1847-1869 exhibit. When Ishikawa so collection was offered at Christies in 1993, the cover sold for \$210,000 hammer (plus premium) to Guido Craveri, who in turn sold it to Tito Giamporcaro. Mr. Gross acquired it in the 1999 Spink sale of the Titos collection for \$300,000 hammer plus premium.





The 5c provisional surcharge was necessary due to a shortage of 5c stamps just after the transition from Postmaster Whitney to Jackson. Most were made by Jackson's clerk, Alvah Clark, around the start of 1857. New supplies of the 5c stamp (Scott No. 8) were received at the end of June 1857.

Five of the eighteen 5c provisional covers recorded by Gregory (Hawaii Foreign Mail to 1870, Volume III, Appendix II-F) were carried on this trip of the Vaquero, which stopped at Honolulu on its way from Australia and carried two bags of mail when it cleared Honolulu on June 27, 1857. She returned to safe harbor with a broken mast and left again on June 29 with additional mail, arriving in San Francisco on July 16 (Gregory, Vol. II, pp. 54-55). The mail from the Vaquero, including this cover, was carried on the PMSS Co.'s John L. Stephens, departing San Francisco on July 20 and arriving at Panama City on August 3. It was then carried by the famous steamship Central America, departing from Aspinwall on August 3 and arriving at New York on August 12.

Brainerd was active in the YMCA, where he served as director in New York and eventually as Secretary General of the International Committee. He advocated an evangelical emphasis and a moderate attitude towards race relations.

# HISTORY AND COMMENTARY

# An Extraordinary Combination of Stamps from Paradise

The Hawaiian 5� provisional surcharge was created in 1857 during a



shortage of 5 the stamps just after the transition from Honolulu postmaster Henry M. Whitney to Joseph Jackson. The April 1855 increase in the U.S. transcontinental rate from 6 to 10 made the Hawaii 13 Kamehameha III stamp obsolete, since it was based on a composite rate of 5 Hawaiian, 6 U.S. and the 2 ship captain's fee. When the supply of 5 stamps was exhausted, 13 sheets were changed to a 5 denomination by writing the numeral "5" on each stamp. Most were made by Jackson's clerk, Alvah Clark, around the start of 1857. New supplies of the 5 stamp were received from Boston at the end of June 1857.

Fred Gregory's census in Hawaii Foreign Mail to 1870 lists 18 covers with the 5� on 13� surcharge. Three were carried on the same trip of the Yankee from Honolulu on March 11, 1857. Only two have this combination of imperforate stamps. There is a third cover with the same denominations, but the 1� pair is perforated. The mixed franking paid the 5� Hawaii and 10� U.S. postage, plus the 2� ship fee. This cover is addressed to Mrs. H. W. McCoughtey in New Bedford, Massachusetts. McCoughtey's name and title as Registrar of Public Accounts appears in ads placed by the Hawaiian Minister of Finance's office in the Polynesian (starting 11/2/1859).

The first collector known to have owned this cover was John F. Seybold, a pioneering collector of covers. In 1909 Seybold committed suicide, and his collection was bought from the estate by John T. Coit and the prominent New York dealer, J. C. Morgenthau, who put the collection into three auctions between March and April 1910. This cover was sold in the first Seybold auction on March 15-16, 1910. It reappeared in the 1911 Morgenthau sale of the Spiegelberg collection and then 46 years later in the Alfred H. Caspary sale, where it was bought by Ezra D. Cole for Emmerson C. Krug. Robert Siegel sold the Krug Hawaii collection privately, and the cover passed to the Hon. J. William Middendorf II, whose Hawaii collection was offered anonymously in Siegel Sale 316 (April 1967). The cover was acquired by Philip G. Rust and later appeared in the 1987 Rarities of the World sale, where it was bought by Ryohei Ishikawa. From Ishikawa it passed to Guido Craveri, Tito Giamporcaro and Joseph Hackmey. The Hackmey collection was purchased privately by William H. Gross in 2010.





The Gregory census lists 18 covers with the 5c on 13c surcharge (Volume III, Appendix II-F). Five were carried on this trip of the *Vaquero*, which stopped at Honolulu on its way from Australia and carried two bags of mail when it cleared Honolulu on June 27, 1857. She returned to safe harbor with a broken mast and left again on June 30 with additional mail, arriving in San Francisco on July 16. Mail to the east was postmarked in San Francisco on July 20 for the sailing of the PMSC *John L. Stephens*, which arrived in Panama City on August 3. At least some of the mail from the *John L. Stephens* missed the two sailings of USMSC steamers on August 3 (based on east coast postmarks on other No. 7 covers from the same Honolulu sailing). If this cover missed those sailings as well, then it was likely carried on the August 13 sailing of the *Illinois*, which arrived in New York September 3 after a stop at Havana.
